Subject: **BTEC Art and Design Practice**

Exam board: Pearson



The opportunity to explore a variety of equipment, techniques, and processes. For example: Drawing and mark making, 3D & product construction, photography, digital & graphics media, and fashion & textiles.

Experiment with a range of media which includes: Ink, charcoal, pastels, paint, clay, wire, fabric, card, wood, glass, photography & digital media.

Research and study historical and contemporary contextual sources (artists, photographers, and craft practitioners).

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

- An interest in drawing and visual imagery.
- A curiosity to create 2D/3D artwork.
- Maths/English/ICT skills The use of measuring devices to help scale your work.
- Written annotation will be required to explain thought processes and analysis of artist work.
- Photoshop and other editing software for image manipulation.
- Creative thinking and problem solving
- Developing concepts or design ideas as part of the progression of your work.
- Conveying an experience or responding to a theme.
- Research skills finding information for a purpose.
- Organisational skills organising your time and reviewing.

Subject: GCSE French

Exam board: Edexcel

What will I do on this course?

Develop **communication skills** and proficiency in speaking and understanding French.

Confidence in expressing yourself and sharing your ideas. Focus on **literacy skills** and understand how to form sentences, write texts and use French independently. **Cultural knowledge** of France and French speaking countries.

This GCSE is suitable for students who are interested in developing their language skills and gaining cultural knowledge of France. This could lead to further study or work in a variety of careers and countries.

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

A desire to learn to speak French and an interest in languages, travel and other cultures.

Linguistic skills – you will be developing your own confidence and fluency in French.

Communication skills – you will be expressing yourself and giving opinions in French.

Commitment – independent learning is key to success and you will need to learn grammar concepts and vocabulary.

Subject: **GCSE Geography**

Exam board: AQA



Examine and learn about:

Physical features of the world: ecosystems, a UK environment, rainforests, hot climates, climate change, rivers, coasts, weather and tectonic hazards.

Human features of the world: population growth, development gap, economic development, UK resources, food as a resource, urban challenges and issues.

Application of geographical skills: Fieldwork visit and geographical enquiry.

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

An interest in the world around us.

Map skills – you will be using maps to identify locations and describe landscapes.

Problem solving – this will be required to solve geographical problems such as climate change and coastal erosion.

Teamwork – investigation of specific topics in teams to deepen subject knowledge.

Communication – you will present findings of investigations carried out.

In the first coursework unit students will explore the growth and development of an individual from childhood to the older adulthood life stage


The second coursework unit requires students to plan and deliver creative and therapeutic activities to a small group of individuals.

Subject: **GCSE History**

Gain knowledge and understanding of various historical periods in order to discuss, analyse and critically evaluate key events and interpretations.

Learn how to use a range of source material to comprehend the significance of events and people within the historical context.

Develop communication and writing skills to form your own viewpoints about the past and clearly explain and express informed judgements with confidence.

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

An interest in understanding how the past has occurred and a fascination of why historical developments help to inform the present and future.

Literacy skills – you will be writing extended answers on various topics.

Communication skills – you will be discussing and explaining your views and judgements both in speech and writing.

Emotional skills – you will be studying sensitive periods of history and so empathy towards others and maturity is required.

Subject: Vocational Award Hospitality and Catering

Exam board: Eduqas



The examination unit of the course enables students to gain and develop comprehensive knowledge and understanding of the hospitality and catering industry including provision, health and safety, and food safety.

In the coursework unit learners will gain knowledge and understanding of the importance of nutrition and how to plan nutritious menus. They will learn the skills needed to prepare, cook and present dishes. They will also learn how to review their work effectively.

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

- An interest in the food and cooking industry.
- Practical skills you will be expected to prepare a range of basic and complex dishes.
- Problem solving you will be required to plan, prepare and cook a 2 course meal within a specific timeframe.
- Research skills finding out information about appropriate nutrition for specific groups of people and suitable recipes to meet their needs.
- Organisational skills organise your time when cooking and completing coursework tasks.
- Evaluation skills evaluate your practical work.

Subject: **Cambridge Nationals Sport Science**Exam board: OCR

What will I do on this course?

- Learn how to prevent and treat sporting injuries.
- Learn how different medical conditions can affect sports performance.
- Apply the principles of training to fitness and skills development for sporting activities.
- Apply knowledge of good nutrition to improve sporting performance.
- Understand how the body systems change and develop in response to physical training.

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

Research skills - finding information about a variety of topics using books, articles and the internet.

Analysis skills – analyse results from fitness tests, evaluate the effectiveness of treatments for sporting injuries and methods of training for different aspects of fitness and skill development.

Thinking skills – use knowledge learned to create a fitness programme to improve fitness and skills development, produce a nutrition plan, to improve sports performance.

Organisational skills – organising your time to meet deadlines, organise your work so that it is coherent.

Subject: **BTEC Tech Award in Performing Arts (Dance)**

Exam board: Pearson

What will I do on this course?

Dance is a powerful and expressive subject which encourages students to develop their creative, physical, emotional and intellectual capacity, whatever their previous experience in the subject.

This course recognises the role of dance in young people's lives and students will study a range of dance styles and style fusions. Apart from the solo performance, they can choose any style in which to perform and choreograph, providing it meets the assessment criteria.

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

Students wishing to study dance should have a passion and interest for dance. They should be prepared to perform and choreograph work for other performers. Additionally, students need to analyse and evaluate dance performances within a written examination.

Subject: GCSE Drama

Exam board: AQA

What will I do on this course?

Our GCSE Drama course offers students the opportunity to explore drama as a practical art form in which ideas and meaning are communicated to an audience through choices of form, style and convention. Students will create, perform and respond to drama informed by their theoretical knowledge of drama and theatre.

The subject content for GCSE Drama is divided into three components: understanding drama, devising drama and texts in practice. For the practical units students choose to work as performers or designers (design students may choose lighting, sound, set, costume or puppets).

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

To be a successful student of GCSE Drama, you should have an interest in drama and theatre and be willing to work collaboratively within a small group.

Subject: **BTEC Music**

Exam board: Pearson

What will I do on this course?

Developing and applying the musical knowledge, understanding and skills set out in our BTEC qualification will enable you to form a personal and meaningful relationship with music. You will be encouraged to engage critically and creatively with a wide range of music and musical contexts and reflect on how music is used in the expression of personal and collective identities.

The subject content is divided into the three components:

- Exploring music products and styles
- Music skill development
- Responding to a music brief.

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

To be a successful student of BTEC Music, you should have an interest in music as well as music performance and composition.

Subject: **Separate Science** Exam board: AQA

What will I do on this course?

Students following this course receive a separate GCSE grade in Biology, Chemistry and Physics. Students must complete the course for all three Sciences and are not able to select which Sciences they study.

Students learn through a mixture of theory and practical lessons in the same way as they would if they were following the Combined Science route. The Separate Science course covers the same units as Combined Science, but in a lot more depth, with more mathematical content required for full understanding of these units. Physics GCSE also has an extra unit, which covers Space.

The Separate Science course has a more substantial practical element, and students complete twenty-eight required practical activities. These required practicals are assessed across each of the six exam papers.

What sort of skills do I need to be successful on this course?

- A real love for Science! The Separate Science course is very knowledge rich and can prove challenging due to the timetabled hours and the rigour of the course.
- Determined, motivated and strong work ethic.
- An ability to analyse and evaluate information to a high degree. Higher tier GCSE Maths is preferred.
- Understand and make informed judgements about Science-based issues.
- Conduct practical and investigative work and be aware of health and safety.
